Another Great KL&L Convention

Another Key Lock & Lantern annual convention has come and gone, and as usual it was over too soon. With so much to do in the area related to its railroad and industrial history, Scranton, PA has been the perfect location for the convention.

Formal activities began on Friday with a chartered trolley over the Laurel Line interurban route. Since the trip was over a line that offers regularly scheduled public rides, some members were at first hesitant to sign up. Those doubts were immediately cast aside after departure, though.

The Electric City Trolley Museum gave us the first class treatment, with photo runbys at otherwise inaccessible locations and stops at our request, including inside the Crown Avenue Tunnel. We also enjoyed a guided tour of the museum's restoration shop, which is also not included in the public runs. What an awesome excursion!

Room hopping (which is somewhat impractical in the Radisson Lackawanna Station Hotel) has been replaced with a Friday evening gathering in the hotel lobby. There is something special about seeing a DL&W lantern change hands in a place that it may have passed through over 100 years ago. The pre-show trading was just a preview of the main event, though.

As usual, the displays at the Saturday show were excellent, and there was plenty of railroadiana for sale or trade. It was nice to see many National Association of Timetable Collectors members exhibiting this year. For many years, the KL&L Convention was a "hardware only" event, and our efforts to update its image are starting to pay off. Lantern collectors are still well represented though, and the mobile parts store set up by Joe Bokanoski has been a great resource for restoration projects (you can find a link to his Antique Lantern online store on the KL&L website).

While several regular exhibitors had their usual exceptional displays, Dave Feneziani pulled off the win for Best in Show with his Dietz lanterns. Many rare and unique artifacts are in private collections, and this is the one chance to see many of them each year. Thanks to everyone who put in the effort to bring displays and items to sell - you are what makes the convention happen.

Also, thanks to our convention committee of John & Marie Brainard for doing all of the organizational work, Pete Gores for arranging the excursion, the New York-Pennsylvania Collector magazine for its financial sponsorship, and David Monte Verde for his DL&W program at the dinner. Also, to the members who pitched in to help, and our board of trustees for taking the time to attend our required business meetings. It takes a lot of effort to make things happen, and the core group of members who do the bulk of the work are much appreciated.

On that note, we are always looking for volunteers to take on various tasks, both large and small - your organization is what you make of it! As always, thanks for everyone's ongoing support.

Key Lock & Lantern returned to the historic industrial and transportation hub of Scranton, PA over the weekend of May 3rd through 5th for its 47th annual convention. The former DL&W Radisson Lackawanna Station Hotel once again served as convention headquarters, with events also taking place at nearby Steamtown and the adjacent Electric City Trolley Museum.

Many members arrived on Thursday evening, and enjoyed a visit to Steamtown and the trolley museum during the day on Friday. Later in the afternoon, a chartered trolley took convention attendees on a special excursion over the route of the Laurel Line interurban electric railroad. A historical narrative was provided by Electric City Trolley Museum volunteers and supplemented with commentary by host railroad Delaware-Lackawanna RR president (and KL&L member) David Monte Verde.

The trolley made several photo stops along the line which are not part of the regular public trips, including several remote locations that are not otherwise accessible. Upon arrival at the end of the line, KL&L members were given a guided tour of the museum's restoration shop, which normally can only be viewed from a window in the visitor center. Returning to Scranton, the trolley arrived back at the Steamtown platform just in time for photographers to catch the arrival of the DL job on its return from Slateford Junction.

After dinner and the KL&L board meeting, members began to gather in the hotel lobby for the current variation of the

KL&L convention tradition of "room hopping." Many preshow trades took place in what was once the main waiting room of the station, including several DL&W lanterns that may have passed through Scranton when still in use. As usual, there were plenty of deals made that evening.

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Friday night trading took place in the Lackawanna Station hotel lobby, with plenty of pre-show deals.

The main event of the convention took place on Saturday morning in the main ballroom of the Lackawanna Station Hotel. Over fifty tables of railroad and industrial history exhibits and memorabilia for sale filled the room in the annual Transportation History Exposition. Displays covered many topics, ranging from Boston & Albany RR artifacts to early broadside timetables. The Best in Show award went to a nicely arranged exhibit of lanterns by Dave Feneziani.

The general membership meeting of Key Lock & Lantern took place at 11:00am, and the slate of officers and trustees was approved for the year. Following the meeting, the annual fundraising "auction" was held, where donated railroadiana was sold to the highest bidder, with all proceeds going to support the activities of KL&L. Exhibitors then enjoyed box lunches and made last minute trades before closing time.

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

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

Railroad Historical Societies Plan Fall Convention & Meeting Schedule

While we are currently in the middle of the tourist railroad and museum season, autumn is just around the corner and with it comes many railroad historical society conventions. The events kick off with the New Haven Railroad Historical and Technical Association's annual reunion on September 7. After a successful meeting last year in Essex, Connecticut, the group will be returning to the home of the Valley Railroad again this year.

Three different conventions will take place over the weekend of September 19-21. The Penn Central Railroad Historical Society is holding its annual convention in Albany, NY, with events including tours of several local railroad facilities. The members of the Erie Lackawanna Historical Society will be gathering in Marion, OH, with a full schedule of programs including tours of the station museum and AC Tower. And, the Spokane Portland & Seattle RR Historical Society will be meeting in Astoria, OR. Activities include a ride on the Oregon Coast Scenic Railroad and bus tours of nearby historic sites.

The following weekend of September 26-29 includes one convention on the east coast and one in the midwest. The Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Historical Society Convention will be held in Baltimore, MD, with headquarters at BWI Airport. In addition to a variety of lecture programs, tours of both modern railroad facilities and museums are planned. The members of the Monon Railroad Historical-Technical Society will meet in Monticello, IN over the same weekend, with a full schedule of lectures and other events, including an excursion on the Hoosier Valley Railroad

The Missouri Pacific Historical Society annual convention will be held in Ft. Smith, Arkansas over the October 10-13 weekend. Planned activities include a swap meet, lecture programs, and an excursion on the Arkansas & Missouri RR. The Nickel Plate Road Historical & Technical Society will hold its convention over the same weekend, in Fort Wayne, Indiana. Presentations about the restored Nickel Plate steam locomotive #765 are among the many planned activities.

Some of the conventions and programs are open to the public, while others are "members only" events. For more information, check out the Event Calendar at www.klnl.org, which includes links to the various organizations.

California State Railroad Museum Introduces Redesigned Transcontinental Railroad Exhibits



The California State Railroad Museum in Sacramento is proud to present several new and/or redesigned exhibits timed to coincide with the 150th anniversary of the completion of the Transcontinental Railroad.

InApril, the Museum debuted an enhanced "Chinese Workers' Experience" exhibit in the first-floor Transcontinental Gallery that showcases and shares stories of the of Chinese railroad workers who were essential in the building of the Transcontinental Railroad. To help personalize and bring their experiences to life, the Museum convened members of a Chinese Community Advisory Committee to obtain personal histories and stories from descendants of Chinese railroad workers. Many of their shared recollections – that have been passed down for generations – were incorporated into the exhibit.

Highlighted by four interpretive panels, two video monitors, four 3-D shadow boxes and an interactive component, the emotionally-powerful exhibit allows visitors to immerse themselves in the toil and experiences of Chinese railroad workers who endured and persevered through severe weather and treacherous terrain.


Already home to both the priceless "lost" Gold Spike and the famous "Last Spike" painting by Thomas Hill, the Museum recently debuted yet another exciting acquisition as part of the Gold Spike Exhibit redesign – an engraved gold oval locket made from the excess gold sprue left over after the casting of the gold spikes. The gold locket includes historic engravings, imagery and elements significant to the Transcontinental Railroad, including a depiction of the gold spike being driven between the two meeting tracks.

Aspecially-created display case – made to rotate and magnify the locket – was designed for this newly acquired treasure that was secured by the Sacramento Pioneer Association and the California State Railroad Museum Foundation. The prized locket is now part of the Museum's collection and is on permanent display. Additionally, the redesigned area now includes an interpretive Gold Spike monitor surrounded by a custom-painted canvas frame – created by local artist Jeremy Stanger – that highlights (in gold leaf) what is engraved on the back of the locket.

Another enhanced and visually-exciting element to the redesigned Gold Spike exhibit is a new projection system that includes historic photos that are positioned next to the "Last Spike" painting. Museum guests can now compare, contrast and gain a better understanding of art, memory, and the history of this moment in time. This exhibit also includes a 3-D interactive and a touch-enabled component for the visually impaired with the audio available in both English and Spanish. All of the new and/or enhanced elements of the redesigned Gold Spike exhibit area will remain on permanent display inside the Museum.

KL&L Remembers Long-Time Convention Participants

Railroadiana collector's meets affiliated with Key Lock & Lantern have been held for almost fifty years, and during that time we have been always been fortunate to have a core group of members who have been "regulars" at the conventions. Their excellent displays, willingness to share their knowledge, and overall good company are what makes the KL&L conventions a success. Sadly, this year we lost two of those familiar faces who were for many years a huge part of the annual event.

Cal Bulman was one of the original members of Key Lock & Lantern when it was founded in 1966, and he often hosted informal gatherings for collectors at his home in the Rochester, NY area. While he had a reputation as a fierce competitor on the auction and flea market trail, he was also welcoming to new members and always happy to share his knowledge of railroad history and memorabilia. A long-time member of the KL&L Board of Trustees, Cal gave countless hours to the organization and was a regular contributor of material for the magazine. An enthusiastic collector of all types of railroadiana from the northeast, even after he sold much of his collection he still could be found at local auctions and estate sales, hunting for new finds. Cal Bulman passed away on July 15, 2019.

Participants in the Key Lock & Lantern conventions in Albany will no doubt recall the excellent displays arranged by Joe Van Hoorebeke, with his sets of colored-globe lanterns from roads such as the New York, West Shore & Buffalo and the New York, Lake Erie & Western. Joe was never afraid to pull out the rarest lanterns from his collection and bring them to the convention for everyone to enjoy. A man of strong opinions, Joe was always willing to engage in a friendly debate on topics ranging from modern railroading to global economics (and more subdued discussions on collecting railroadiana). While his wife, Sandy Shaw-Van Hoorebeke, was serving as Secretary at KL&L board meetings, Joe kept things going with the convention "room hopping." In addition to lanterns, he was a serious collector of locomotive builders plates and was always willing to share his knowledge with other members. Joe Van Hoorebeke passed away in November, 2018.

Both Cal and Joe will be missed by their fellow collectors and friends at Key Lock & Lantern.




Requirements are listed on the U.S. government website at https://www.volunteer.gov/results.cfm?ID=17117 and are basic: you need to have an internet connection, own a computer with Microsoft Word installed, be able to send and receive email, and (perhaps most importantly) have an attention to detail. Some of the documents are typewritten; others are handwritten. Either way, this is a great way for you to participate in the preservation of our nation's rail history from the comfort of your own personal keyboard.





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
